This accelerated three-day annual conference brings together professionals and leaders from across the juvenile justice field. Attend this conference to gain a deeper understanding of juvenile justice law, including changes to Wisconsin Statutes. Gain the skills to develop more effective departmental policies and procedures and to better enforce juvenile law. Interact with juvenile corrections staff, a court commissioner, an assistant attorney general, human service providers, and others.

- Review recent legislative changes in pupil records statutes, giving law enforcement more options for requesting information from schools consistent with Wisconsin Act 309.
- Review recent case law on interrogation of students by law enforcement officers in schools and searches of student cell phones.
- Review the latest information on the legislative requirements prohibiting cyber-bullying in schools and law enforcement's role in enforcing the prohibition.

This intensive, focused, and cost-effective conference brings you up-to-date on:

- Statutory and case law pertaining to children and juveniles, including WI Chapters 48 and 938
- Changes in state and federal juvenile case law and statutes, including recent U.S. Supreme Court decisions on child abuse investigations involving law enforcement officers and on interrogating special needs students
- Procedures in the state's juvenile court system, including intake, hearings, and dispositional alternatives
 - Special needs of the child who is accused of a crime, in need of protection or services, abused, or mentally or emotionally ill
 - Components of successful school-related programs
 - Roles of the police-school liaison officer
 - Law-enforcement officers' roles in preventing school violence



The **Juvenile Law Conference** has trained more than 3,500 law enforcement officers since 1967. Frank J. Crisafi, JD, has been with the program since the beginning. He brings his many years of experience as an attorney in the juvenile justice system to his role as program planner, facilitator, and instructor.

Frank J. Crisafi, JD, is a former chief juvenile prosecutor in Milwaukee County and attorney for the Madison Metropolitan School District. He practiced law in the areas of juvenile justice, special education, confidentiality of pupil records, and school discipline. He currently teaches seminars in juvenile justice administration and school law for social workers and law enforcement officers throughout Wisconsin.

Lindsey Draper is a former court commissioner for Milwaukee County and a former assistant district attorney with Milwaukee County Children's Court. He currently works with the Wisconsin Office of Justice Assistance.

Vic Karaliunas is a former Waukesha County intake worker.

Dave Perlman is an assistant attorney general with the Wisconsin Department of Justice.

Eric Szatkowski is a Special Agent with the Wisconsin Department of Justice/Division of Criminal Investigation (DCI).

Luis Yudice is the coordinator of school security for the Madison Metropolitan School District and a former captain in the Madison Police Department.

Other instructors include staff from the Wisconsin Department of Corrections, Division of Juvenile Corrections.
